Castle Rock Adds to Her Industry a New Creamery Company.

Douglas county has just added to her industry a new enterprise, which promises to be one of the foremost of the kind in the state—The Castle Rock Creamery Company. The ob-

ject of the company is the manufacture and making of pure butter.

The incorporators are William Dillon, who is well known as the brother of John Dillon, the Irish patriot Charles Woodhouse, Charles H. Ellis, George Engle, John G. Blunt and W. E. Howerton, all old, respected and prominent citizens of Douglas county, and the majority of them stockmen.

It is the object of the new company to manufacture and sell to the public nothing but a pure and unadulterated article of creamery butter. The company will start in with a thousand head of the best graded cows in the state and with the superior facilities of good grass, pure water and the most approved machinery of modern times for the manufacture of a pure article of butter having every hope that the undertaking will be a success.

Douglas county is coming to the front very rapidly in this industry as well as in the manufacture of cheese, and the names of the incorporators of the new undertaking are a guarantee that it will be a success

Cheese Factory.

Commissioner Williams' cheese factory on Cherry creek opened up for the season a little over a month ago and is doing a much larger business than last year. This institution is a great convenience to the dairymen in that vicinity, as furnishes a ready market for the milk, which is quite an item in these days of glutted butter markets.

Mr Williams has his factory fitted up with all the conveniences necessary to make a superior article, and everything is kept neat and clean. He has an experienced cheese maker and proposes making a quality of cheese that will bring the highest market price, in fact that will outsell the eastern cheese that is being shipped here, and which is made from milk bought at a much lower price than he pays his patrons.

The rooms for caring for the cheese until it is ready for market are arranged for convenience and are well fitted for the purpose for which they are used.

A well inside the factory furnishes an abundance of water, and machinery has been erected to make the boxes for the cheese. Pipes are laid to convey the whey to a tank outside, where the patrons can drive to it and get their share to take home. The first shipment of cheese for the season was made this week.

Mr. W. has also fitted up a room where he intends keeping family groceries for the accommodation of such of his patrons as may find it

The item in this paper last week regarding the resumption of work at the Case cheese factory was not altogether correct. It appears that the new manager is G. C. Vail, an old citizen of Colorado who has rented the factory and has purchased the Hau machinery from Mr. Kaempfer, as well as the mortgage upon the plant.

Mr. Vail will put up a bond of \$1,000 to secure to the farmer payment for their milk. It is his plan to start up business about April 1. John Rupert, formerly cheese maker for D. R. Williams will be in charge of the plant. Altogether the prospect for the institution being run from now on in an entirely satisfactory manner is very bright and it is to be hoped that the results will be so favorable as to amply repay the farmer in the Case neighborhood for their efforts in securing the erection of

ANOTHER DISAPPOINTMENT.

The Creamery at Hill Top Fails to Pay the Ranchmen for Milk Delivered.

The ranchmen in the vicinity of Hill Top have met with another serious disappointment in the matter of the creamery located there. After having been closed down for several months the plant was recently started up by parties operating under the name of Scott & Co. The cream was shipped to Denver and then delivered to the Hurlbut Grocery Co., which paid Scott & Co. promptly for all goods received. The creamery people, however, made only one settlement with the ranchmen bringing the cream. This was at the end of the first eleven days. Since that time all efforts to secure money were futile and finally a committee of Hill Top men went to Denver to investigate. They then discovered the unsatisfactory conditions of the affair and employed a lawyer in hopes of securing the money due the ranchmen, which amounted all together to about four hundred dollars. In the meantime the creamery is closed and the farmers
